BIOGRAPHY OF PROFESSOR S JAYAKUMAR Chairman, CIL International Advisory Panel, National University of Singapore

Professor S JAYAKUMAR was Singapore's former Deputy Prime Minister and Senior Minister. Professor Jayakumar has held various portfolios such as Minister for Home Affairs, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Minister for Labour, and was also Minister for Law, for 26 years. He served as Singapore's Permanent Representative to the United Nations, and High Commissioner to Canada from 1971-1974 and a member of Singapore's delegation to the Third Law of the Sea Convention. In addition he oversaw the *Pedra Branca* case before the International Court of Justice (ICJ) as well as the *Land Reclamation* case before the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS). He is the author of



several books, the most recent being 'Pedra Branca – The Road to the World Court' (together with Prof Tommy Koh) and 'Diplomacy - A Singapore Perspective', and has written many articles on topics of constitutional law, international law and legal education. Professor Jayakumar served as Dean of the National University of Singapore's Faculty of Law. He now serves as the Chairman of the Law Faculty's Advisory Council and also as Chairman of the International Advisory Panel of the Centre for International Law (CIL). He is also consultant at the law firm of Drew and Napier.

BIOGRAPHY OF PROFESSOR TOMMY KOH Chairman, CIL Governing Board, National University of Singapore

Professor Tommy KOH is Ambassador-At-Large at the Singapore Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Chairman of the Centre for International Law, Rector of Tembusu College at the National University of Singapore and Special Adviser of the Institute of Policy Studies. He is the Co-Chairman of the China-Singapore Forum, the India-Singapore Strategic Dialogue and the Japan-Singapore Symposium. Professor Koh was the President of the Third United Nations Conference on the Law of the Sea and chaired the Preparatory Committee for and the Main Committee at the Earth Summit. He was Singapore's Permanent



Representative to the United Nations for 13 years, Ambassador to the United States for six years, and served as the United Nations Secretary General's Special Envoy to Russia, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. He was also Singapore's Chief Negotiator for the US-Singapore Free Trade Agreement and has chaired two dispute panels for the WTO. Professor Koh acted as Singapore's Agent in the case concerning *Pedra Branca* before the ICJ and in the *Land Reclamation* case before ITLOS. He is a student of international law and, in particular, on law of the sea. Professor Koh was recently named the recipient of the 2014 Great Negotiator Award (an award given out by an inter-university consortium comprising Harvard University, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Tufts University and the Future of Diplomacy Project at Harvard Kennedy School).

BIOGRAPHY OF PROFESSOR ROBERT BECKMAN Director, Centre for International Law, National University of Singapore

Robert BECKMAN is the Director of the Centre for International Law (CIL), a university-wide research centre at the National University of Singapore (NUS). He also heads CIL's Ocean Law & Policy Programme.

Professor Beckman received his J.D. from the University of Wisconsin and his LL.M. from Harvard Law School. He is an Associate Professor at the NUS Faculty of Law, where he has taught for 36 years. He is also an Adjunct Senior Fellow at the S Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Nanyang Technological University, and a member of the National Executive Committee of CSCAP Singapore.



Professor Beckman currently teaches Ocean Law & Policy in Asia and International Regulation of Shipping at the NUS Faculty of Law. For the past four years he has lectured in the summer programme at the Rhodes Academy of Oceans Law & Policy in Rhodes, Greece, and he is a member of the Governing Board for the Rhodes Academy. He also lectures in the International Maritime Boundary Workshops organized by CIL and the International Boundaries Research Unit (IBRU) of Durham University.

Professor Beckman's main research interest is ocean law and policy issues in Asia. His most recent publication on the South China Sea is in the January 2013 issue of the American Journal of International Law.

Alan <u>BOYLE</u> has been Professor of Public International Law at the University of Edinburgh School of Law since 1995. Recent or current cases include *Pulp Mills on the River Uruguay* (ICJ), *Aerial Spraying* (ICJ), *Bay of Bengal Maritime Boundaries* (ITLOS and PCA), *Japanese Whaling* (ICJ), *Chagos Islands* (PCA) and *South China Sea Case* (PCA).

Professor Emeritus of Environmental Law, Department of Public and International Law,
University of Oslo

Hans Chr. <u>BUGGE</u> is Professor emeritus of Environmental Law at the Department of Public and International Law, University of Oslo.

He holds a doctorate in regional planning from the Université de Paris II (1972) and is Dr. juris from the University of Oslo on a thesis on responsibility for pollution in Norwegian law (1998). In 1998 he was appointed Professor of Environmental Law.



Before he became an academic lawyer in 1991, he held various senior positions as a civil servant in Norway's Ministry of the Environment 1972-82, i.a. as Director General of Norway's Pollution Control Authority, and Director General of the Department for Urban and Regional Planning.

He has also worked extensively with development issues. From 1982 to 1991 he was Secretary General of Redd Barna (Save the Children Norway) running humanitarian and development projects in Asia, Africa and Central America. 1986-87 he served as State Secretary (Deputy Minister) for Development Cooperation and personal advisor to Prime Minister Gro Harlem Brundtland in her work as chair of the World Commission on Environment and Development.

He has been vice chair of the board of the national Research Council of Norway, dean for research at the Faculty of Law, and chair of the faculty's interdisciplinary Research group in Natural Resources Law.

Bugge has lectured and written extensively on national and international environmental law and sustainable development.

Günther <u>HANDL</u> is the Eberhard P. Deutsch Professor of Public International Law at Tulane University Law School in New Orleans, Louisiana. law and law of the sea. Prof. Handl is the recipient of a number of awards, including the Prix Elisabeth Haub 1997. He has served in an advisory capacity to a number of governments, as a consultant to various international organizations, including the United Nations Environment Programme, the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, the Asian Development Bank and the World Bank, as well as a lecturer for the United Nations Codification Division, Office of Legal Affairs and The Hague Academy of International Law.

LAN Hua is Associate Professor of Faculty of International Law, China University of Political Science and Law (CUPL). She holds law degrees from Wuhan University Law School (LL.M. and J.S.D.) and Nanchang University Law School (LL.B.). She has taught required upper-level course in International Law, as well as Upper-level courses in Selected EU Case Study, International Organization Law, Legal English, and China and WTO. Youna LYONS is a senior research fellow with the Centre for International Law at the National University of Singapore focusing on regional environmental governance in Southeast Asia. Her primary research areas are offshore oil and gas in Southeast Asia including decommissioning and the prospects for rigs to reef, the use of satellite imagery to inform marine environmental management through habitat mapping and maritime boundary disputes on remote features, the protection of marine sensitive environments in the seas of Southeast Asia and the underlying legal and institutional governance framework.

Catherine <u>REDGWELL</u> is currently Chichele Professor of Public International Law in the University of Oxford and a Fellow of All Souls College. Other affiliations include membership of the Greenwich Forum, the Council of the ILA British Branch, the IBA's Academic Advisory Group of the Section on Energy, Environment, Natural Resources and Infrastructure Law, and of the IBA's Climate Change Justice and Human Rights Task Force. Formerly general editor of the *International and Comparative Law Quarterly*, she is currently joint general editor of the *British Year Book of International Law* and co-editor of *Oxford Monographs in International Law* (OUP). Professor Redgwell has published extensively in public international law, particularly

Recent publications include co-authored new editions of Birnie, Boyle and Redgwell *International Law & the Environment* (OUP, 3rd edn, 2009), *Lyster's International Wildlife Law* (CUP, 2nd edn, 2010), and *Energy Law in Europe* (OUP, 3rd edn, 2014). She is currently co-investigator in a two year (2012-2014) research project on Climate Geoengineering Governance funded by the ESRC and AHRC.

Nicholas A. <u>ROBINSON</u> is the University Professor for the Environment at Pace University, and Gilbert and Sarah Kerlin Distinguished Professor of Environmental Law Emeritus at Pace University School of Law, and Professor Adjunct at the Yale University School of Forestry & Environmental Studies. He is also the Co-Director of the Center for Environmental Legal Studies (CELS). Professor Robinson has developed environmental law since 1969, when he was named to the Legal Advisory Committee of the President's Council on Environmental Quality. He has practiced environmental law in law firms for municipalities and as general



counsel of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. He drafted New York's wetlands and wild bird laws and was inaugurated as the first chairman of both the statutory Freshwater Wetlands Appeals Board and Greenway Heritage Conservancy for the Hudson River Valley. He has served as legal advisor and chairman of the Commission on Environmental Law of the International Union for the Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources, engaged in drafting treaties and counseling different countries on the preparation of their environmental laws. He founded Pace's environmental law programs, edited the proceedings of the 1992 United Nations Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and is author of several books and numerous articles. He teaches a number of environmental law courses.

Professor Robinson served as James D. Hopkins Professor of Law during the 1991–1993 academic years.

On March 2009, the Pace University Board of Trustees conferred the position of University Professor for the Environment on Nicholas A. Robinson for his significant contribution to scholarship in the field of environmental law, both in the USA and abroad.

Simon <u>TAY</u> is a public intellectual as well as private advisor to major corporations and policy-makers.
