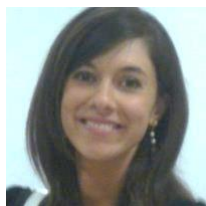

ACHARYA	<p>Professor Upendra D ACHARYA Gonzaga University School of Law, USA</p>  <p>Professor Upendra D Acharya is a professor and Norman & Rita Roberts Scholar at Gonzaga University School of Law. He holds an LLB from Tribhuvan University, Nepal; MCL from Delhi University, Faculty of Law, India, LLM. from University of Utah and SJD from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He served as an associate professor at the Faculty of Law, Tribhuvan University and practised law in Nepal. He continues to qualify to practise in the Supreme Court of Nepal. He has represented landmark cases in the Supreme Court of Nepal, including a daughter's right to inherent property, and the Godabary Marble case, which resulted in the passage of the first Environmental Protection Act in Nepal. He has been a visiting professor at several law schools, including in Brazil, France, China, India, Italy, Lebanon and Mexico. He is currently a vice president of Asian Society of International Law and a co-chair of the Planning Committee of the AsianSIL Biennial Conference 2019. He also serves as the chair of the Human Rights Special Interest Group of the Society. He is a founding member of Global Policy Forum for Nepal, a global think tank headquartered in London. Professor Acharya has presented papers on human rights, humanitarian law, international economic law and other areas of international law in North and South America, Middle East, Europe and Asia. He has written extensively on cutting-edge issues of international law, including terrorism, US Foreign Policy, globalisation, international economic law, and human rights and human security.</p>
ANGHIE	<p>Professor Antony ANGHIE NUS Centre for International Law</p>  <p>Professor Tony Anghie qualified as a Barrister and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Victoria and practised law in Melbourne, Australia before commencing his graduate studies at Harvard Law School, where he earned his SJD degree and was appointed as a Senior Fellow in the Graduate Program. He then taught at the SJ Quinney School of Law, University of Utah, where he served as the Samuel D Thurman Professor of Law. He has been a visiting professor at numerous schools including the American University Cairo, Cornell Law School, the London School of Economics, Harvard Law School and the University of Brasilia. He has served in different capacities on the governing bodies of the Asian Society of International Law since its founding, and was a principal organiser of the Society's biennial Conference in Beijing in 2011. He delivered the Grotius Lecture at the annual meeting of the American Society of International Law in 2010.</p>

BAGARES	<p>Mr Romel Regalado BAGARES Centerlaw-Philippines Lyceum Philippines University College of Law</p>  <p>Mr Romel Regalado Bagares (LLB, University of the Philippines, 2003; MA, VU-Amsterdam, <i>cum laude</i>, 2007) serves as the Executive Director of the Center for International Law–Philippines(CenterLaw), a non-profit organization dedicated to the promotion of the Rule of Law in the Philippines and the ASEAN region through binding international legal norms. In law school, he was on the editorial board of the <i>Philippine Law Journal</i> (P.L.J.), and at graduation, he was awarded the inaugural <i>Myers S. McDougal Writing Prize in International Law and Jurisprudence</i> and the <i>Justice Irene Cortes Writing Prize in Constitutional Law</i>. In April 2010, he won a fellowship from the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs of the Republic of France under its <i>Programme d’invitation des personnalités d’avenir</i> (Invitation Program for Personalities of the Future) for a short period of study in Paris, France on topics of professional interest to him. As a lawyer, he has extensive experience litigating public interest and human rights cases before various Philippine courts, including the first legal challenge against President Rodrigo Roa Duterte’s deadly drug war. As counsel for the Philippine Coalition for the International Criminal Court (PCICC), he also recently filed a petition against the President Duterte’s unilateral decision to withdraw Philippine treaty commitments under the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court. He is lecturer in public international law at the Lyceum Philippines University College of Law and his research interests lie at the intersection of the history and theory of international law. He was recently elected as trustee and treasurer of the Philippine Society of International Law (PSIL).</p>
CHIMNI	<p>Professor Dr B S CHIMNI Jawaharlal Nehru University, India</p>  <p>Professor Dr BSChimni retired in 2017 as Professor of International Law, School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University. He was a visiting professor at Brown and Tokyo Universities and held visiting positions at Harvard, Cambridge, Minnesota and York universities. His areas of research interest include international legal theory, international economic law and international refugee law. His most recent publications include the second edition of his book <i>International Law and World Order: A Critique of Contemporary Approaches</i> (Cambridge University Press 2017) and a co-edited book (with Siddharth Mallavarapu) <i>International Relations: Essays for the Global South</i> (Pearson 2012).</p>

Riara Law School, Kenya



Professor Sylvia Kang'ara is the Founding Dean of Riara Law School and an Associate Professor of Law. During her tenure, the Law School has retained its status as a fully accredited legal education provider in Kenya and is ranked among the top law schools in the country.

Before her appointment, Professor Kang'ara taught at the University of Washington School of Law, Seattle, and at the Oklahoma City University Law School. Prior to that, she was an international legal associate in the project finance and equipment-leasing department at White & Case, LLP, New York Office. She has given lectures or presentations at various institutions including the University of Cape Town, South Africa; Harvard Law School, USA; Goethe University, Germany; University of Perugia-Italy; Osgoode Hall Law School, Canada; and King's College, London.

KANG'ARA

Professor Kang'ara's academic interests are in the domestic and international laws of investment and development as well as in comparative private law and theory. She has published several articles, most recently a book chapter titled 'China and Africa: Infrastructure Development and Colonial Legacies of Property Law' published in *Bandung, Global History, and International Law: Critical Pasts and Pending Futures* (Cambridge University Press 2017). In this article, she argues that conceptual and institutional biases of colonial legal regimes regarding African ownership of property are at play in recent compulsory acquisitions of land for infrastructure development. In 2012, she published 'Beyond Bed and Bread: Making the African State through Marriage Law Reform—Constitutive and Transformative Influences of Anglo-American Legal Thought' in the *Hastings Journal of Law & Poverty*. In this article, Professor Kang'ara uncovers the juridical template produced by years of marriage law reform in Africa. She discusses the compromises that African countries have made to produce a pragmatic regime that simultaneously adopts new thinking about marriage while observing 'African' value choices and customary law prescriptions. She concludes that this history shows that the laws governing family and property are as constitutive of the family as they are of the developmentalist state and are therefore also tools of governance.

Professor Kang'ara is a graduate of the University of Nairobi and Harvard Law School. In the course of her doctoral studies at Harvard, she received awards from the Association of American University Women, the Lincoln Institute of Land Policy, and the Institute for the Study of World Politics. She is admitted to the Roll of Advocates in Kenya and is also an Associate of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators. In 2016, the Attorney General appointed her to the Governing Council of the National Crime Research Centre, a state corporation.




Dr Lalin KOVUDHIKULRUNGSRI

Dr Lalin Kovudhikulrungsri is a lecturer at the Faculty of Law, Thammasat University, Thailand. Her main focus has been in air and space law, human rights law and public international law. She received her Ph.D. in Law from Leiden University on a dissertation relating to the right to travel by air of persons with disabilities. This study explores issues facing persons with disabilities from a legal perspective. Multilevel legislations - namely international, regional and national rules from human rights law and aviation law - are compared, contrasted and analyzed. She also holds a LL.B. from Thammasat University and a LL.M. from the Institute of Air and Space Law, Faculty of Law, McGill University, Canada. Before joining Thammasat University, she worked as a lawyer for several years. At present, she focuses on how Thailand implement international law and standards published by an international organizations into national law as well as how domestic courts

apply these international legal instruments.
