INTRODUCTION

The Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia (ECCC) is an internationalized criminal tribunal established by agreement between the United Nations and the Government of Cambodia to prosecute and try atrocities committed by senior members of the Khmer Rouge. One of its most innovative features is the existence of a system of reparations for victims (civil parties) of crimes under its jurisdiction. In the light of international law standards and legal sources, this seminar examines institutional, substantive and procedural features of the system of reparations at the ECCC. Attention is drawn to the law and practice of the ECCC as well as related achievements, limitations, and challenges ahead.
