30 September 2021: Philippines Files New Protests over Chinese Presence in South China Sea

The Philippine foreign secretary on Thursday ordered that new diplomatic protests be filed against Beijing over the ongoing presence of more than 100 Chinese ships in waters claimed by Manila in the South China Sea. Teodoro Locsin Jr., who is in the United States for an official visit, issued three messages via Twitter ordering the Department of Foreign Affairs to file the protests. The new diplomatic protests are the latest since the Philippines began filing daily protests against Chinese incursions in Manila's exclusive economic zone in the sea earlier this year. "File now our protest on China's incessant & unlawful restriction of Filipino fishermen from conducting legitimate fishing activities in Bajo de Masinloc," Locsin said, using the Philippine name for the Scarborough Shoal.

"While the U.S. welcomes the idea of revisiting the MDT, an outside party does not," he said. "The former Chinese ambassador came to me and said: 'Please do not touch the MDT. Leave it as it is," said Lorenzana. He later clarified the conversation took place in 2018. "It did surprise me. I asked him why? He said any attempt to revise the MDT would be construed by the Chinese government as act to contain the rise of China," Lorenzana told Reuters. Asked how he responded, Lorenzana said: "I just looked at him and smiled".

29 September 2021: Philippine 'Angels of the Sea' use their voices to repel Chinese ships

The foreign fishing boats were deep in Philippine waters near a speck of coral reef known as Sabina Shoal. They bore no official markings, but their blue hulls of reinforced steel — used to ram other vessels — were the telltale signs of Chinese maritime militia. They had not come to fish, but to stake a claim to the sea. A white patrol ship approached. A woman's voice lifted through the crackle of a radio: "This is Philippine coast guard. You are within Philippine exclusive economic zone. You are requested to provide the following: name of vessel, intention, last and next port of call." The stand-off quietly ended as all seven Chinese boats pulled up anchor and sailed to other waters. The radio operator, Ensign Gretch Mary Acuario, was hailed a hero on social media and lauded in local news reports as "the woman who made the Chinese ships go away."

22 September 2021: Duterte asserts: South China Sea Arbitral Award must be honored by all nations

For the second time, President Duterte has stressed the importance of the 2016 Arbitral Award of the South China Sea before the United Nations (UN), saying no country can disregard it nor diminish its importance. Duterte made the statement as he virtually addressed the 76th United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) on Wednesday morning, September 22 (Manila time). In his speech, the President stressed the importance of the peaceful resolution of disputes, including the one in the South China Sea. According to Duterte, the Philippines is one with the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and other stakeholders in ensuring the South China Sea remains a sea of peace, security, and prosperity. 21 September 2021: PLA holds Y-20 aircraft transport mission, landing drills in South China Sea

21 September 2021: Philippines backs Australia-UK-US security alliance

Foreign Affairs Secretary Teodoro Locsin Jr. specifically noted the benefits of Australia's decision to join the trilateral pact that will further enhance its military capability, saying its proximity in Southeast Asia would allow it to respond quickly to regional threats and challenges. "Proximity breeds brevity in response time; thereby enhancing an ASEAN near friend and ally's military capacity to respond in timely and commensurate fashion to a threat to the region or a challenge to the status quo," Locsin said in a statement.

21 September 2021: AUKUS defense pact draws support from some Southeast Asian nations, concern from others

Some Southeast Asian nations are concerned a new security agreement between the U.S., Australia and the United Kingdom could lead to an arms race and more aggression in the region. Some Southeast Asian nations, including Thailand and Vietnam, didn't immediately comment on AUKUS. Singapore, however, issued an upbeat statement Thursday, detailing a phone call that day between Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong and Morrison. Philippine National Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana in a call with Australian Defence Minister Peter Dutton on Friday acknowledged Australia's right to improve its submarine defense and noted that the Philippines is also building capability to protect its territories, according to a statement from the Philippines' Department of National Defense.

14 September 2021: Chinese embassy in Vietnam slams visiting Japanese defense minister's attacks on China

The Chinese Embassy in Vietnam on Monday refuted Japanese Defense Minister Nobuo Kishi's verbal attacks on China during his visit to Vietnam. Kishi falsely accused China of "attempting to use its power to change the status quo" in waters near Diaoyu Island, of "intensifying situation in East China Sea and South China Sea through its coast guard law," and grossly interfered in China's internal affairs related to China's Taiwan region, said the Chinese Embassy in a statement. The enactment of the coast guard law, which is China's routine

legislation, did not target any specific countries, and completely complied with international law and international practice, according to the statement.

12 September 2021: Wang Yi: China, Vietnam should avoid unilateral moves over South China Sea

China and Vietnam should resolve their disputes on the South China Sea issue through friendly consultation and not take any unilateral action, Chinese State Councilor and Foreign Minister Wang Yi said on Saturday. He called for joint efforts from the two countries to maintain overall stability in the South China Sea and deepen maritime cooperation. China stands ready to work with members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) to advance talks on the Code of Conduct in the South China Sea (COC) and reach a substantive and effective COC, he said.

12 September 2021: Japan, Vietnam sign defense transfer deal amid China worries

Japan can now give defense equipment and technology to Vietnam under an agreement signed Saturday, as the two countries step up their military cooperation amid worries about China's growing military influence. Japan's Defense Minister Nobuo Kishi said the deal elevates their defense partnership "to a new level" and that Japan and Vietnam plan to deepen defense ties through multinational joint exercises and other means. 11 September 2021: China warns Vietnam to watch out for outside interference in South China Sea

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi warned of interference from regional outsiders, as he urged Vietnam not to "magnify conflicts" in the disputed South China Sea. Wang's remarks, made during talks with Vietnamese Deputy Prime Minister Pham Binh Minh in Hanoi on Friday, came around two weeks after visiting US Vice-President Kamala Harris called on Vietnam to join the US in challenging China's "bullying". "We should treasure the hard-won peace and stability in the South China Sea and place maritime-related problems in a suitable position. [We should] not complicate the conditions, [or] magnify conflicts through unilateral moves, and should both be alert in resisting interference and incitement from regional outsiders," Wang said, according to an official statement.

Philippine Defence Secretary Delfin Lorenzana has promised that Manila will ignore China's amended maritime law, which now requires foreign vessels sailing in the South China Sea to report their information to Chinese authorities. "Our stand on that is we do not honour those laws by the Chinese within the West Philippine Sea because we consider that we have the sovereign right within this waters. So we will not recognise this law of the Chinese," Lorenzana said during an event marking the Philippines' Mutual Defense Treaty (MDT) with the United States

"What is crucial is the enforcement of the 2016 ruling, to uphold the rule of law. The CoC must be a mechanism of enforcing the arbitral tribunal [ruling] and not allow the CoC to undermine the arbitral ruling," Del Rosario said during the inaugural Ambassador Rodolfo C. Severino Jr. organized by the Ateneo de Manila University.

6 September 2021: Chinese research ship on maiden voyage to South China Sea amid distrust by neighbours

One of China's most advanced new research ships has headed to the South China Sea on its maiden voyage as Beijing boosts exploration in the resource-rich waters despite distrust by its neighbours. The Shiyan 6, or Experiment 6, geophysical and seismic survey ship left a port in Guangzhou on Monday for "key scientific tasks" in the estuary of the Pearl River in Guangdong province and the northern part of the South China Sea, state-owned Science and Technology Daily reported.

1 September 2021: China implements revised law to boost power of maritime authorities

China on Wednesday implemented a revised law to strengthen the power of its maritime safety authorities, amid concern that the move could escalate tensions with other countries, including Japan, in nearby waters. 8 September 2021: Destroyer Performs FONOP, U.S. Navy Disputes Chinese Claim That It Ousted Warship

The U.S. Navy is disputing a claim from China that it chased an American warship out of the South China Sea after the U.S. vessel performed a freedom of navigation exercise. USS

Benfold (DDG-65) on Wednesday sailed near the Spratly Islands – which China has staked a claim to – according to a news release from U.S. 7th Fleet. The People's Liberation Army (PLA) quickly criticized the FONOP and claimed it chased the U.S. guided-missile destroyer out of the waters, according to a report in state-owned media outlet CGTN. Tian Junli, a spokesman for the PLA's Southern Theater Command, said it "remain[s] on high alert," CGTN reported.

4 September 2021: India, Singapore hold drill in South China Sea

India and Singapore on Saturday completed their three-day joint exercise at sea conducted at the southern edge of the South China Sea. The two countries did what was the 28th edition of Singapore-India Maritime Bilateral Exercise (SIMBEX). Since the first week of August, a flotilla of four Indian warships is on an overseas deployment to the South East Asia, the South China Sea and Western Pacific. The deployment of the Indian Navy is aimed at expanding its operational reach, peaceful presence and solidarity with friendly countries. In the exercise with Singapore, three Indian Naval warships — INS Ranvijay, INS Kiltan and INS Kora — participated along with a P8I Long Range Maritime Patrol Aircraft. The Singapore Navy fielded RSS Steadfast, RSS Vigour, one Archer Class Submarine and one Fokker-50 Maritime Patrol Aircraft. Four F-16 fighter aircraft also participated in the exercise.

2 September 2021: Beijing's new law for foreign vessels won't impact US Navy in South China Sea, Pentagon says

An amendment to China's 1983 Maritime Traffic Safety Law that took effect Wednesday requires certain vessels to provide a checklist of information, including call signs, positions, estimated time of arrival and the next port of call, the Chinese state-run Global Times reported Sunday. The amendment specifies that submersibles, nuclear-powered vessels and ships carrying dangerous substances, such as oil or chemicals, must notify Chinese officials before entering areas China claims as territorial waters, according to the Naval War College's Stockton Center for International Law. The amendment was approved in April by China's Standing Committee of the National People's Congress. However, U.S. forces, under international law, will continue to transit those areas or operate in them, according to a Defense Department spokesman. "The United States will continue to fly, sail and operate wherever international law allows," Lt. Col. Martin Meiners told Stars and Stripes in an email Wednesday.

2 September 2021: US says new Chinese rule that vessels register for South China Sea access threatens freedom of navigation

The Pentagon on Wednesday appeared to dismiss Beijing's new demand that all foreign ships entering the South China Sea must register with Chinese maritime authorities, calling it a "serious threat" to freedom of navigation and trade. "The United States remains firm that any coastal state law or regulation must not infringe upon navigation and overflight rights enjoyed by all nations under international law," said John Supple, a Pentagon spokesman, in response to questions about China's decree this week. "Unlawful and sweeping maritime claims, including in the South China Sea, pose a serious threat to the freedom of the seas, including the freedoms of navigation and overflight, free trade and unimpeded lawful commerce, and the rights and interests of South China Sea and other littoral nations," he said.

2 September 2021: China tells U.S. prolonged tensions would hurt climate cooperation

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi has told U.S. climate envoy John Kerry that prolonged tensions between the world's two major powers would make it difficult for them to work together in the climate field, according to official Chinese media. Wang's remarks on Wednesday came as Beijing has been at odds with Washington over several issues, including its alleged human rights abuses in Xinjiang, the crackdown on freedoms in Hong Kong, and security challenges to Taiwan and in the South China Sea.
