ASEAN in its External Legal Relations

- 1. In this seminar we shall be examining how ASEAN deals with the world outside of itself. Please read the EPG Report (2007), paras. 37, 39, 50-53 and the ASEAN Charter (2007), Chapter XII (External Relations), especially Art. 41. What are the key concerns and concepts that ASEAN raises regarding its external relations role and functions?
- 2. (Read Acharya) What is ASEAN Centrality? What is the significance of ASEAN Centrality in ASEAN's external relations? Has it been effective in disputes such as the South China Sea Dispute? What are some instances where ASEAN Centrality could and could not be seen?"
- 3. (Read Chesterman) If ASEAN wants to act as a collective entity in the international arena, it should be more than merely the sum of its parts. ASEAN as a holistic unit needs legal personality:
 - a. What is international legal personality?
 - b. Does ASEAN possess legal personality formally, pre- and post-Charter?
 - c. To what extent is ASEAN's legal personality meaningful?
 - d. What is the scope of ASEAN's powers if it has legal personality? What acts can it do? Has it done so in that capacity? Why? Why not?
- 4. (Refer to lecture slides, esp. slide 14) Having understood ASEAN as legal person, we go on to dissect how it acts vis-à-vis external parties in legal relations

- a. What are the different modalities ASEAN employs when operating with external parties? Explain briefly the characteristics of each.
- b. Which is the most popular modality? Why?
- c. What are the ambiguities or potential problems in how ASEAN conducts its external legal relations across the various sectors?
- d. What could be wider indicators of ASEAN collectivity?

ASEAN in its External Trade Relations

- 5. (Read Kuijper et al. exclude the part on "demi-common agreements") Understanding that ASEAN's economic relations with the world is a key strategy to building the ASEAN Community, we now turn to look specifically at ASEAN's external trade agreements.
 - a. What are the foreseeable problems in ASEAN external trade agreements?
 - b. What are the characteristics of the external trade agreements ASEAN has with its different trading partners?
 - c. What are the factors explaining the substantive reach of ASEAN external trade agreements and their role in economic integration? (This should be a lengthy and detailed answer. Break everything down into the core concepts, and maybe some detail in terms of 1-2 examples.)
 - d. What are the pros and cons of the ASEAN-X mechanism in ASEAN's external trade agreements? What are the examples of where has it been helpful and unhelpful? Should ASEAN continue to make external agreements with the current ASEAN-X mechanism or should there be some changes to it?
 - e. What are the different models of improvement? How do they suit different situations? What would give ASEAN the best advantage?
- 6. (Read Pushpanathan and the ASEAN + 3 Economic Ministers Joint Statement) What are the key differences between ASEAN's approach to external trade relations in the past, and its approach now, after the COVID-19 pandemic? Justify your answer with reference to the readings and instruments above.
