



**Serbest Ensarioglu** is a Ph.D. candidate at Ankara University Faculty of Law, where he has served as a research assistant since 2018. His research focuses on international law and human rights, with particular attention to their historical and theoretical foundations. His work draws on global history and political theory, with a special emphasis on the legacies of empire and decolonization.

He completed his LL.M. with a thesis offering an analysis of sovereignty through Augustinian thought, highlighting its significance for both early Christian political theology and modern political theory. His doctoral research critically examines the universality–cultural relativism debate as a false dichotomy in human rights, situating it within the historical legacy of the Bandung Conference and postcolonial struggles. His publications include a book chapter titled *Right to Food*, published in a volume by the Nestlé Foundation.

From 2023 to early 2025, he was a visiting researcher at the Department of History at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, working under the supervision of Professor Cemil Aydin. In 2025, he participated in the Harvard Law School IGLP Global Scholars Academy. He recently completed a visiting research stay at Peking University Law School with Professor Yifeng Chen and is currently beginning his visit at the National University of Singapore Centre for International Law.

Beyond academia, Ensarioglu has collaborated with national human rights institutions, providing training and policy support. He previously served as Vice President of the Turkish Rugby Federation and is also involved in renewable energy initiatives in Turkey.
