

Are All International Climate Obligations *Erga Omnes*?

Further Reflections on the International Court of Justice's Advisory Opinion on the Obligations of States in Relation to Climate Change

This roundtable discussion webinar will critically examine the International Court of Justice's recent advisory opinion on States' obligations in relation to climate change, with particular attention to whether, and to what extent, such obligations may be characterized as *erga omnes*.

It will assess the legal foundations and implications of this characterization, including its relationship to treaty-based and customary international law duties, *erga omnes* (*partes*) obligations under multilateral environmental agreements, and relevant human rights obligations. The discussion will also consider the consequences for State responsibility, legal standing, and available remedies in cases of climate-related harm.

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Dr. Priya Urs is Junior Research Fellow in Law at St John's College, University of Oxford. She holds a PhD from University College London and an LLM from the University of Cambridge, where she won the David Thompson Prize (Homerton College).

Priya's current research examines the nature of states' obligations *erga omnes* and the scope for the enforcement of these obligations in international law. Her work in this area was cited at the International Court of Justice in *Application of the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide (The Gambia v Myanmar)* (Declaration of Judge ad hoc Kreß).

An article on this subject was also awarded the inaugural *ICLQ Hazel Fox Early Career Prize* (2025). Her earlier work in international criminal law is published as the monograph *Gravity at the International Criminal Court: Admissibility and Prosecutorial Discretion* (OUP 2024) and an article on that subject also won the *Journal of International Criminal Justice Prize* (2020).

Dr. Craig Eggett is Associate Professor of Public International Law at Maastricht University and the Programme Coordinator of the LLM in International Laws. Craig teaches public international law, international dispute settlement, and international institutional law to both undergraduate and graduate students.

His research concerns the foundations of international law and the law and practice of the United Nations, with particular expertise on the sources of international law. Craig is a member of the Globalisation and Law Network and the Maastricht Centre for Human Rights.

Conrado Maximmanuel Cornelius (Conrado) is an Indonesian lawyer and academic with extensive professional working experience in the legal industry and academia. He commenced his professional career initially as a corporate lawyer and has had the working experience of advising and assisting domestic and foreign clients, both individual and large multinational companies, in almost all areas of Indonesian commercial law. As an academic, he has published extensively on environmental- and climate law topics with leading academic publishers such as Oxford University Press, Cambridge University Press, and TaylorFrancis. Moreover, he has also served as an independent legal consultant advising several Indonesia-based United Nations (UN) bodies and international non-government organizations on various environmental- and climate law issues. Prior to joining CIL-NUS, he worked as an adjunct lecturer at the Faculty of Law, Universitas Indonesia.
