

Dr. Thomas Lehmann is a French avocat at the Paris Bar and a scholar specialising in public international law and international arbitration, with a particular focus on energy disputes.

He is currently Assistant Editor of the Journal of International Arbitration, having served as a 2025–2026 Research Fellow in International Arbitration at NUS and as the White & Case Fellow conducting the 2025 Queen Mary University and White & Case International Arbitration Survey. His scholarship spans international investment arbitration, energy and climate change law. His monograph *Investment Arbitration and International Climate Change Law: Revaluing Legitimate Expectations* (Kluwer) has been described, among other reviews, as poised to assist practitioners, arbitrators, and treaty drafters navigating net-zero disputes. He lectures, presents, and publishes widely on arbitration, energy and climate law and won the 2026 Young ICCA Essay Competition.

Dr. Lehmann currently acts as counsel in arbitration proceedings, building on experience as counsel and tribunal secretary in more than 25 high-stakes arbitrations under ICC, ICSID, LCIA, and UNCITRAL rules with leading arbitrators and firms, including Gaillard Banifatemi Shelbaya Disputes and Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton.

Thomas is an alumnus of Paris-1 Sorbonne University (Bachelor and LLM); Humboldt University of Berlin (Bachelor); Toulouse-1 University (LLM); City University of Hong Kong (LLM); and Queen Mary University of London (PhD, 2024). He was called to the Paris Bar in 2025 and is fluent in English, French, and German.
